A Conversation with the Conductor Demetrius Fuller Gives His Take on Sinfonia Gulf Coast's 17th Season

Sinfonia Gulf Coast has a stellar 2022-2023 season line up. From world-renowned vocalists and violinists to Broadway's brightest stars, Beethoven musically mashed with rock bands. Curating a season that "sings" is an artform and Sinfonia Music & Artistic Director Demetrius Fuller is pitch perfect for the 17th year. With celebrity appearances, classical connections and innovative Northwest Florida debuts, this year's offerings redefine the symphony experience and offer something for everyone. Zandra Wolfgram recently sat down with maestro Fuller to get his take on Season 17.

ZW: Jeremy Jordan is the Sinfonia Cabaret offering at Seagar's (Sept. 15). Why did you invite this particular performer to wow us?

DF: Jeremy is really a multifaceted artist. He got his start on Broadway in the original cast of Newsies, which is a wonderful show. He is a Tony and Grammy nominated artist, but more recently, he's done a lot of film and drama. Most recently with Kerry Washington in a play on Broadway, and in the hit TV show Supergirl. He's sort of a "triple threat" — he can sing, act and dance. Plus, he's just an



amazing artist. He transcends all of the music genres: classical, Broadway and pop. Jeremy is a talented artist, a great musician and a nice person. I think people will really love him.

ZW: October 11 is the highly anticipated Gala Event with the incomparable Patti LaBelle. Do tell us more.

DF: Who doesn't know Patti LaBelle? And to know her is to like her. To bring "the godmother of soul" to the stage with her 60 years in the business is a feather in our cap and an absolute thrill. She's just as nice as she could be, and she's simply incomparable. That's really the only word. There is nobody like Patti LaBelle. We're honored to be able to present her and her whole band on the Sinfonia stage. She joins our special exclusive Sinfonia sorority joining Vanessa Williams, Roberta Flack, Kristin Chenoweth.

ZW: What motivated you to create the Gala Event experience? Bernadette Peters was a showstopper for Sinfonia's inaugural season and set at a very high bar. What prompted you stage a celebrity-studded Gala Event in a major hall like the Destin-Fort Walton Beach Convention Center?

DF: It's a standalone event. It really has separated Sinfonia from anything else, not only in our community but along the Gulf coast, because none of the other regional orchestras bring in the caliber of artists that Sinfonia does. Sinfonia is what I call one-stop symphony shopping. It runs the gamut we have the gala, which is a pinnacle event, the full orchestra, Pops, chamber orchestra, chamber music, education programs, non-orchestra events, like the Cabaret and Crescendo! and wine events. So, the Gala Event really is just part of the puzzle piece that is sort of the angel on the Christmas tree, so to speak.

ZW: On October 22, the full orchestra will accompany the full film showing of the 1931 horror film based on Mary Shelley's book, The Bride of Frankenstein. This is a different experience than a typical concert.

DF: The Bride of Frankenstein has one of the most amazing orchestral scores in film history. It's full orchestra, so we'll have 65 to 70 musicians on stage in the Mattie Kelly Arts Foundation's Cultural Arts Village al fresco just before Halloween. It's about 90 minutes. It will be fun.

ZW: December 9 we have a popular offering that is always changing. Holiday Pops is a tradition, but you always put a twist on it.

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Governor Funds Future Trucking Needs

Dr. Devin Stephenson and Northwest Florida State College hosted Gov. Ron DeSantis and his entourage for an announcement concerning a sizable expansion of Florida's Commercial Driver's License (CDL) training. DeSantis also announced the creation of new opportunities for apprenticeships in Florida. De-Santis awarded \$1.5 million to NWFSC to expand the capacity of CDL training programs. These funds aim to enhance the existing CDL driver training program at its Chautauqua Center in DeFuniak Springs, including the purchase of equipment, to potentially serve 250 students in the program's first vear.

He also announced nearly \$12 million to Florida school districts, colleges, state universities, and private training entities to further support the governor's workforce development initiatives. These funds



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are intended to start or expand registered apprenticeship and pre-apprenticeship programs throughout the state through the Florida Pathways to Career Opportunities Grant (PCOG).

"In Florida, over the past three years, we have made significant investments into workforce education, with an emphasis on trucking and the entire transportation industry," DeSantis said. "With today's announcements, we have now increased our CDL training capacity at state institutions from less than 1,000 prior to 2019 to more than 3,500. These investments are driving the growth of our rural communities and state as a whole."

"We already know that a traditional university path is not for every student," said Manny Diaz, Jr., Commissioner of Education . "Thanks to the leadership of Gov. DeSantis, students now have a variety of options



to get on the road in a new career. With the governor's continued support, our state colleges are perfectly positioned to meet industry demand and advance Florida's economic independence and prosperity."

DEO Secretary Dane Eagle marked, "The Florida Department of Economic Opportunity is proud to support Gov. DeSantis in his ongoing commitment to investing in workforce development and training initiatives in high-demand industries. Nearly everything we depend on in daily life is made possible through the

trucking industry, and these strategic investments will positively impact hardworking Floridians, the trucking industry and the state's economy, while also ensuring that Florida is No. 1 in workforce development by 2030."

Michelle Dennard, Career-Source Florida President and CEO spoke next: "Florida is a critical link in our nation's supply chain, and the demand is soaring for Commercial Driver's License holders. With the leadership of Gov. Ron DeSantis and our education partners, the CareerSource Florida network is honored to help connect Floridians with the vital training needed for careers in transportation and logistics."

Michelle Burns, Career-Source Okaloosa Walton Executive Director, said, "Commercial vehicle drivers are a backbone of our economy and crucial to our continued economic growth. Niceville's Field of Valor Honors Fallen Service Members

More than 300 flags are on display at the Mullet Festival Fairgrounds, honoring those who gave their lives in the service of their country.

The ninth annual Field of Valor, set up by the Niceville Exchange Club, recognizes those service members from the state of Florida who have fallen in combat since September 11, 2001. Some 396 flags are posted on the Niceville field, each with a tag bearing the name, photo and information about a Floridian who served in Iraq or Afghanistan who lost his or her life in action.

One local Gold Star mother, Karla Lacey, attended the Field of Valor this year, as she has in years past, to honor her son Sgt. First Class William Lacey of Laurel Hill. She works at Fort Walton Machining, which was one of the event sponsors this year, as it has in years past.

"He was brave beyond

brave," his father, John Lacey told Military Times just after his son's death in Afghanistan. "He was out there in the middle of nowhere, in hell, and he kept doing it over and over and over

... I'm just so proud of him." Visiting the Field of Valor hasn't always been easy for the Lacey family. Karla has been attending for several years, because it has been a healing experience for her. She also volunteered to spend time as a docent at the field this year, as she has in previous years.

Tammy Summers, a Gold Star wife, also attended this year's opening ceremonies. She took photos for her Facebook page of her husband, Sgt. First Class Severin W. Summers III, who died August 2, 2009 in Operation Enduring Freedom.

On the memorial page she has created to honor his memory, she posted: "I am honored and humbled to participate in putting out flags for our fallen



military in my hometown of Niceville, FL. I placed Sev's flag out and attached his biography. Remembering him today and always!"

Don "Pockets" Pardue was the chair for this year's event. The former Marine admitted that honoring the military is a particular passion of his, especially honoring those who made the ultimate sacrifice.

Pardue served as the emcee for the opening ceremony, which included dignitaries including the mayors of Niceville and Valparaiso, as well as several military guests.

Emerald Coast Fisher House President Jim Yurack was a guest speaker Saturday. The local Fisher House receives funds from the annual fundraiser and works with the Niceville Exchange Club in fielding volunteers for the weeklong remembrance of fallen servicemembers.

Brig. Gen. Jeffrey T. Geraghty is the Commander, 96th Test Wing, Air Force Materiel Command, Eglin Air Force Base, made remarks about the importance of remembering the events of September 11, 2001, as well as the sacrifice of servicemembers in defeating the enemies who emerged from those events. "Continue to use today, and days beyond just today as an opportunity to pay homage to those who died serving our nation and to acknowledge the immense debt we owe them," Brig. General Geraghty said.

Lt. Col. Mike Loconsolo, commander of the 1st Battalion, 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne) at Camp "Bull" Simons, Eglin Air Force Base, FL. A native of Brooklyn, NY, the remembrance of 9-11 has special significance for Lt. Col. Loconsolo, who was a cadet at West Point on that day, and whose father worked in the north tower of the Twin Towers in NYC. His father survived the attack, but the memory was life changing for his entire family, he told his audience, and he hopes Americans never forget that day.

Col. Ed Hubbard, former Vietnam-era prisoner of war and motivational speaker, talked

Hero and True American Patriot: Rear Admiral Philip Dur

Rear Adm. Philip Dur was this month's speaker at The Fort Walton Yacht Club. Members and guests of the Okaloosa County Republican Club sat enthralled by his speech and the depth of knowledge, which covered a wide range of historical subjects and contemporary insights. He mentioned feeling at home among a group of like-minded patriotic Americans.

He applauded all those who served during the Cold War (1945-1991), the last war that America won. His speech was peppered with insights into the past, but his primary focus was on the dangerous future we face.

Philip Dur was born to a diplomat and spent most of his early years overseas. He was educated in the United States, earning undergraduate degrees in international studies followed by a Ph.D. from Harvard. As a 33-year-old commander in the United States Navy, he briefed President Ronald Reagan every day for 30 minutes for months. He thought of the president as

a genuine American, brave with love for this country and its people that knew no bounds. He believes this country needs such a leader with Reagan's stature to take us through the troubled times ahead.

He served our nation and the Navy for 30 years at the height of the Cold War and in its aftermath as the Navy struggled to redefine it-

self in the post-Soviet era world. Dur's career as a surface warfare officer — with a specialization in national policy - took him through a series of exceptional assignments ashore and afloat, where he was both a witness to history - and had a hand in shaping its course.

Dur provided a front-row seat to some of the pivotal events in our nation's history, from the Israeli attack on the USS Liberty



during the Arab-Israeli War in 1967 to the high-stakes diplomacy as an adviser to President Reagan during the Beirut Crisis of 1983. He was also a participant in the last great act of the Cold War with the Black Sea bumping incident between a Soviet frigate and the ship Dur was commanding - the USS Yorktown.

As a flag officer, he was the chief architect of the Navy's strategy. Admiral Dur's story provides a concise description of the Navy's role in the Cold War from the 1960s to its end with the fall of the Soviet Union. His seat at the table during most of the critical events of that period offers an insightful perspective of policy formation execution. and His insights are vital to under-

standing how the United States dealt with the complex issues in maintaining a fragile peace with the Soviet Union, which is again headline news.

Dur is a highly decorated military officer, including the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, the Navy Distinguished Service Medal, the Defense Superior Service Medal and many others. Some people in the audience are old enough

to remember the headlines of numerous events from the Cold War era, but Dur offered "The Rest of the Story." He stressed understanding the importance of freedom of choice and limits of government, and the limits of governance.

He stressed that the most critical role of government is the defense of the American people. It is a defense against foreign and internal threats - crimes against persons and property rampant in this country today. It is essential to focus on the uncertainty and dangerous future ahead. We live in a far more dangerous situation than the one inherited at the end of World War II.

As someone completely unfamiliar with the workings of the Navy, his commanding two great warships — a destroyer and a cruiser-was mind-boggling and fascinating. His stories caused his audience to sit on the edge of their seats, wanting more. His book "Between Land and Sea" is remarkable. A true American hero that I am blessed to call a friend.

Trinity Presbyterian Church Building New Sanctuary

Trinity Presbyterian Church, located in the heart of Valparaiso, has just embarked on the challenging journey of building a new sanctuary. Interestingly, the story of how the church arrived at this juncture is intimately intertwined with the history of the city government in Valparaiso. The building that eventually became Trinity's first sanctuary was built in the early 1950's in the hub of "Old Valparaiso," across the street from Perrine Park.

Trinity Presbyterian Church was formed in 1984 when several families who met together for weekly Bible studybegan a regular worship service in a member's home. With appreciation and love for the Reformed Christian faith, they recognized the need for a good pastor and extended a call to Pastor Mickey Schneider, who with his family moved from Jackson, Miss., in the summer of 1986 to shepherd the flock. His first pulpit at that

time was only a shaky wooden podium in the choral room of Ruckel Jr. High School, where 14 families met for worship on Sundays. As the congregation began slow but steady growth, it moved to "larger facilities" – the school lunchroom – and later to an annex at Twin Cities Hospital.

By 1990, there was enough savings to begin looking for a more permanent worship location. Shortly thereafter, the old Valparaiso City Hall became vacant and available for purchase. Soon, a price was agreed upon and a contract signed!.

One of the church's founding members and long-serving elders, Erik Stoer, recalls that

the police chief's office and a detainee's holding room were both still intact prior to church Remodeling use. included the plans installation of a new bathroom, but the plumbers had great difficulty jack hammering through the concrete slab in order to install sewage pipes, because it was unusually thick to accommodate the weight of fire trucks. Additionally, the building still contained the builtin room-size safe that the city used for storing valuable documents and other items, which Trinity decided to keep and use for its own purposes.

Two adjacent lots were purchased with the need for a larger facility in mind. In 2006, a new administrative building was completed, providing room for offices, a library, and Sunday School rooms. A large Fellowship Hall with a modern kitchen was also constructed at this time.

In 2011, Pastor Schneider announced his plans to retire and the church began to search for the man who would

be our next pastor. After several visits, Trinity celebrated as Ben Rossell responded to the call, and he and his family moved from Maryland to north Florida, with ordination and installation in April 2013 as our new pastor.

With membership approaching 200, Trinity Presbyterian now began a 10-month project that will result in the building of the new sanctuary, designed to seat 350 worshipers. The historic former Valparaiso City Hall, once housing the heart of the city's operations, and then housing weekly worship services, was torn down on Aug. 15, 2022. A new sanctuary groundbreaking ceremony was held on Aug. 22.

Albert Einstein is quoted as saying, "The most powerful force in the universe is compound interest." When someone as brilliant as Big Al talks about the power of compounding, I don't know about you, but I tend to listen.

Well, here's another smart guy, this time from Kiplinger's, who says, "Time is the most powerful weapon in an investor's arsenal! Nothing comes close to it." Why? Because of the power of compounding. Here are some of his key thoughts:

• After 30 years of studying finance, I have found few eternal truths, but the most important – the Golden Rule of Accumulation – is this: Start early!

• Time is the most powerful weapon in an investor's arsenal. Nothing comes close to it.

• Let's do the numbers. The annualized return for U.S. large-company stocks (as represented by Standard & Poor's 500-stock index) for the past 80 years have been about 10 percent, not including taxes. Say your goal is to build a nest egg of \$1 million by the time you are 55. If you start at age 24 and invest \$5,000 a year at an annualized return of 10 percent, you'll reach your goal. But if you wait until you are 34 to start, you'll accumulate only \$357,000 by age 55. If you start at age 44, you'll have just \$107,000.

• How can this be? The answer lies in compounding, the fact that interest increases the value of interest as well as the value of principal. If you earn 5 percent on \$1,000, after a year you'll have \$1,050. After two years, you'll have not \$1,100 but \$1,102.50.

• As time passes, the power of compounding accelerates dramatically.

• One other important fact about compounding is that a small increase in the rate of return can produce a huge impact over time. In the case of the gift to your newborn daughter, if her portfolio returns 10 percent annually, then \$10,000 grows to \$4.5 million by the time she is 65. But if her portfolio returns 8 percent, then it grows to only \$1.4 million. If it returns 5 percent, it grows to a mere \$227,000. In other words, half the rate of return produces an account that's less than one-20th the size.

The article then ends with this conclusion:

But enough numbers. If you're a young person, all you need to know is that you must start early. If you are an older person who has young progeny or young friends, encourage them to start early. If you're particularly generous, set up a long- term trust or a Section 529 tax-advantaged college savings plan, or simply open a mutual fund account that the young person promises not to touch (or perhaps doesn't know anything about).

The piece then goes on to talk about where to invest your money. Me? I like using Roth IRAs as a savings tool. Just a great overall summary of one of the pillars of growing your net worth. Every person needs to know, understand, and apply this financial wisdom to make the most of their finances. I've been doing it for 22 years or so now and the power of compound interest is still really starting to take off – it's really making a strong impact on my net worth. I can't wait to see what it does over the next 20 years!

One of my favorite quotes about "taking action" is this:

The best time to plant a tree is 20 years ago. The second-best time is now.

If you've lost a lot of investing time because you've procrastinated, just didn't know what to do, didn't have the willpower to save, weren't able to save, or whatever reason you might come up with, stop fretting about it. It's water under the bridge. There's nothing you can do to get back that lost time. But you can still make a difference in your finances. How? Start saving today! Twenty years from now, you'll be glad you did.

The **City of Niceville** will dedicate and unveil **three Florida historical heritage**

markers at 10 a.m. Oct. 6, in Niceville's Lion's Park. The Old Maritime City marker will depict the advent of the automobile when all commerce in the area was by water. In 1911, the steamer Belle, loaded with naval stores, sank with the loss of four lives, including local Capt. Noah Edward Burlison. The Niceville Fish Company operated by Claude Meigs and the Spence Brothers Fish Company were the leading commercial fishing industries of the Choctawhatchee Bay region, maintaining fish warehouses and fleets of boats. The Boggy Mill Company Site marker will highlight the timber and lumber industry during the early 1900s. The complex consisted of 40 acres, one of the largest lumber mills operating in the area.

The Niceville Fire 1934 marker tells of the fire that destroyed three grocery stores, a dry goods store, creamery, post office building, hotel, drug store and fish warehouses, estimated at \$100,000 then, but would be worth \$2 million now. There was no running water with which to combat the flames and it appeared for a time that the town would be destroyed until the forest firefighters and CCC workers took charge.

The Annual Niceville Bazaar will be held Oct. 22 at the Niceville Mullet Festival Grounds from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. The organizer, Freedom Life Compass, which moves women from recovery from drug addiction to empowerment, continues on its mission to raise funds for its Freedom House Project.

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NWFSC Ranks Among the Top 10 Safest Colleges in Florida

Northwest Florida State College (NWFSC) has ranked among the top 10 safest college campuses in Florida, according to Niche.com. The rankings for campus safety were established after evaluating campus and community crime rates, rates of violent crimes, and student surveys on crime. NWFSC ranked number 10 out of the 48 colleges and universities evaluated in 2022. NWFSC Executive Director of Campus Safety and Security, Chief Aaron Murray, explained that the College's investment in officer training and development has contributed significantly to its current ranking. "In the last four years, we have developed a robust response capability and built great relationships with other public safety agencies in our region," Chief Murray said. "We have added several technologies and installed additional cameras that vastly improve our ability to monitor situations and respond. We have also actively



worked with multiple departments throughout the College on emergency response training, including bleed control, active shooter responses, firearms safety, self-defense, and rape aggression defense training."

Among the newly incorporated technologies are the Unmanned Aerial Systems. Last month, the college was recognized as one of 10 colleges in the United States to have implemented security drones to improve campus safety, and it is the first in the region to implement a four-member team that can respond to any campus location and launch an aircraft to assist with emergency responses.


The college has also implemented a FLIR SkyWatch Mobile Surveillance and Deterrence Tower, courtesy of Florida State University, which allows officers to have a bird's eve view of outdoor events and identify security issues within a crowd; and the Raider Connect app, which turns cell phones into mobile alert devices. Once the Raider Connect app is activated, campus police officers and the emergency communications center are alerted for an immediate response. The app also provides users access to campus maps, emergency response plans, notifications, and safety training links.

HCA Florida Fort Walton-Destin Hospital and OCSD Partner for Health Academy

The two entities have together launched the Health Academy of Northwest Florida, a program of the Career and Technical Education Department of Okaloosa County School District (OCSD), which provides high school juniors and seniors interested in healthcare careers the opportunity to earn industry certifications. Housed on the campus of HCA Florida Fort Walton-Destin Hospital, the first course offers a two-year Practical Nursing program. Students enrolled will learn the foundational principles of basic nursing and medical skills needed. Students at Choctawhatchee High School, Fort Walton Beach High School and Niceville High School are eligible to participate and will receive

hands-on clinical training at HCA Florida Fort Walton-Destin Hospital during their senior year. Upon completion of the two-year program, students will be eligible to earn a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) and/ or Electrocardiogram Technician (EKG) certification, with skills needed to directly enter the workforce. Juniors who complete the program can apply for dual enrollment in the LPN program at Okaloosa Technical College during their senior year, and get a head start on earning their required course hours toward an LPN license. Students who successfully complete the program will have job placement opportunities throughout HCA Florida Healthcare and, if employed by an HCA Florida Healthcare facility, can receive tuition reimbursement if wishing to continue on their education path. It kicks off this month, utilizing classroom space at Okaloosa Technical College until construction at HCA Florida Fort Walton-Destin Hospital is completed.



sion, adding five extra species of fish for a total of ten eligible fish. The previous leaderboard included grouper, amberjack, scamp, yellowfin tuna and big eye tuna. Being added for this year are dolphin, wahoo, Almaco Jack, snowy grouper and yellowedge grouper.

Alongside the expansion comes another award addition: The **Captain's Award** for the Extended Voyage Division. The board of Directors hopes this expansion will allow more Captains to compete in the tournament.

And yet another addition to the Rodeo in 2022 is a **Ladies**, **Seniors and Junior Divisions** for wahoo – alongside king mackerel, grouper, amberjack and blackfin tuna. The weigh station saw a fair amount of wahoo last year, a real crowd pleaser.

The weigh-ins happen on the docks behind AJs Seafood and Oyster bar, located on the Destin Harbor. They are free to the public and open daily from 10 a.m.-7 p.m. For boats to participate, charter and private boats must be registered at least 24 hours prior to weighing in a fish. There is no fee for anglers fishing on a registered vessel (private or charter) and shore fisherman can participate by simply bringing their catch to the scales. You can fish by kayak, paddle board, pier, bridge, jetty, shoreline and surf - whichever you prefer.

If you're planning to make a trip down to the docks, expect to see a broad spectrum of fish being weighed in. From Sharks to Amberjacks, Grouper to King Mackerel, Tunas to Marlin, the rodeo has it all. Anglers are competing for more than \$100,000 in cash and prizes, awarded for both daily and overall catches.

Even if you're not a fisherman, the energy level and excitement that comes from being at the docks for weigh ins is like nothing else you've ever experienced. Boats back into the scales, pull the fish from their boat while the announcer hypes up the crowd. Fish are strung up on the scale while the crowds cheer and applaud the boat and their team. For the best seat in the house, get there early, grab a few beers and snag a seat on the bleachers by the leaderboard or above on AJ's upper deck.



Halloween on the Harbor will signify the end of weigh-ins on Wednesday. Oct. 31, when the captains, anglers, volunteers and even Miss Destin will be dressed in their favorite costume. Everyone is invited to partake in the fun!

The Rodeo began as a way to repay the loan given for the then new community center. Since its inception, the Destin Fishing Rodeo has expanded into one of the largest fishing tournaments along the Emerald Coast an entire month long, spanning October 1-31st with approximately 30,000 anglers competing each year!





Emerald Coast Classic College Tournament Tickets Go On Sale

Tickets for the eighth annual Emerald Coast Classic college basketball tournament, presented by Global Sports, are on sale at the official tournament webwww.emeraldcoastclassic. site com

Tickets start at \$20 per twogame session. The Classic will be played Thanksgiving weekend Nov. 25-26, at The Arena on the campus of Northwest Florida State College.

Iowa will face Clemson in a



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semifinal round game at 6 p.m. Friday, Nov. 25, while TCU will play Cal at 8:30 p.m. The third-place game will be played at 3 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 26, with the championship game scheduled for a 6 p.m. tip off that Saturday.

Both Iowa and TCU played in the 2022 NCAA the Tournament. with Horned Frogs beating Seton Hall, 69-42, in the first round. TCU fell to top-seeded Arizona, 85-80, in overtime in the second round.

Iowa captured the 2022 Big Ten Conference Tournament championship, tied for fourth in the conference standings and won 26 games, the second most wins in a season in program history.

Fran McCaffery has coached Iowa to 20-plus wins eight of the last 10 seasons, including four straight years.

The Hawkeyes have compet-



ed in the last three NCAA Tournaments and have been ranked in the final Associated Press Poll each of the last three years: No. 16 in 2020, No. 8 in 2021 and No. 25 in 2022.

The Horned Frogs' second NCAA Tournament bid under coach Jamie Dixon was their fourth postseason appearance in the five seasons that postseason was held, the best in program history.

TCU has all five starters re-

turning from its 2021-22 team, which finished 21-13, its fourth 20-win season in six years under Dixon with a program-record five wins over AP Top 25 teams. TCU surged late with consecutive victories over top-10 opponents in Texas Tech and Kansas to secure a NCAA Tournament berth.

Returning starting forwards Hunter Tyson and

PJ Hall will key the fortunes for Clemson, which won five of its last six games to close out the 2021-22 campaign. Brad Brownell is the winningest coach in Clemson history, earning 218 victories in 12 years while guiding the Tigers to the 2021 NCAA Tournament, 2018 Sweet 16, 2011 NCAA Tournament and three NIT appearances.

Mark Fox will enter his fourth season as the head men's basketball coach at Cal and has averaged nearly 19 wins each year in his 17-year coaching career. In previous stops at Nevada and Georgia, Fox has guided teams to five appearances in the NCAA Tournament. Cal boasts 28 postseason appearances, including 19 NCAA Tournament appearances.

Other games at Northwest Florida State College on Friday Nov. 25 have Southern playing Loyola Maryland at 11 a.m. while Louisiana Monroe meets Omaha at 1:30 p.m.

I've dealt with sleep issues over the years. What I've discovered is that getting quality sleep means developing a routine and sticking with it. I have also found a couple nutritionals that have helped me sleep better. As our lives ebb and flow, so does our sleep. However, sleep is critical for our health and ignoring it, hoping it will get better, is not a healthy choice to make. Mine is a work in progress with stress being the main interrupter. So, let's dive in and learn a little more about sleep.

What is sleep? It's restful if we sleep well. It's not an idle mode. Our body and brain are working. It activates a process that helps us rest, repair and recharge.

There are 4 stages in the sleep cycle:

Between wakefulness and sleep – Everything slows down and muscles soften, heart and breathing rates decrease and brain patterns begin to change.

Light sleep – The process continues and body temperature drops.

Deepest state – It's hard to be awakened. Our heart and breathing are at their lowest point, muscles extremely relaxed. It's integral to quality sleep. If this stage is cut short we don't wake up feeling rested.

REM – Rapid eye movement sleep. In many ways it's the opposite of the other three stages. It's the dreaming stage; heart rate increases, breathing rate can quicken and become irregular, eyes move rapidly behind eyelids and brain activity livens. As a protective measure the body can experience temporary paralysis of limbs preventing the body from acting out movement about which we dream.

All 4 stages run through in succession until we wake up. Without both NREM and REM sleep our memory consolidation is harmed.

Things that can interrupt our sleep:

Caffeine, alcohol, diet (sugar intake) or eating too close to bedtime. Physical activity, stress level or emotional state, bright lights or blue light.

Things we can do:

• Put away electronics at least 30 minutes prior to going to bed. Consider removing electronics from the bedroom as the electromagnetic waves can interfere with sleep.

• Develop a consistent bedtime as this will develop a rhythm of our internal clock

• Relax by doing some light stretching

Dim lights

Play soft music, etc.
Use blackout curtains (Light is the signal that turns on and off our sleep hormones.).

• Instead of tossing and turning, consider getting up, take a slow walk around the house, have a sip of warm water, read for a few minutes or stretch using slow movements to relax the body. Then return to bed and focus on your breathing.

Sleep is important for a healthy immune system. Here are a few things that happen when we sleep:

• During sleep immune cells move around, creating memo-ries.

• Immune cell effectiveness is being preserved, proliferation of white blood cells and protective immune proteins (cytokines).



Activation of immune cellsDifferentiation of new white blood cells

• Optimization of natural killer cell function (quick-acting white blood cells of the innate immune system)

When your cells are cared for with quality sleep your supply of bodyguards are stocked, locked and ready to protect you properly.

The American College of Physicians does not recommend taking sleeping pills for a long time as they sedate the mind rather than help to naturally induce sleep. Here are some holistic options:

• Essential Oils:

Methods of use: Inhaling – diffused.

Direct application – to skin, dilution recommended using avocado oil, almond oil, etc.

Ingesting – added to food or drink, get professional advice before utilizing this method

• Oils to consider:



Local Pro Jimy Thorpe Gives Back to the Community

For years, Jimy Thorpe had felt the urge to give back. A veteran, Jimy had served as a young man in the U.S. Army for eight years and had always held the highest regard for the men and women who serve our country and keep us safe. This group also includes first responders – the men and women who keep our communities safe. So, how would he give back? In 2014, he created the tagline "Vets Helping Vets" – later elevated to "Vets Helping



Vets & First Responders" – and decided to start giving what he had to give: HVAC units. Jimy





owns A Superior Air Conditioning Company, a local business he launched in 2003.

In the beginning, Jimy and his team decided to give away eight units per year. Vets and first responders were encouraged to apply online at ASuperiorAC.com; the giveaway was open to all who have served in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, Coast Guard, and all first responders including EMT/ Medics, Police, Sheriffs and Fire Fighters. American Legion Post 392 in Panama City met and voted on all submissions each quarter, selecting one veteran in need and one first responder in need to be awarded the units.

In 2015, the giveaway began taking the form of a quarterly appreciation lunch at Harley-Davidson of Panama City Beach. Local musician Neal James opened the lunches with the National Anthem and play background music while Texas Roadhouse catered. The first event hosted around 40 guests and several local businesses co-sponsored. The next lunch brought in a few more guests and sponsors, and the Vet Center and other veteran-related organizations joined in. As the word-of-mouth continued, the guest list grew. By Fall 2017, the event moved to Texas Roadhouse; today this appreciation lunch still takes place, now maxing out the restaurant at 380+ guests.

But Jimy still wanted to reach

and help more veterans and first responders. In November 2019, Pastor Dave of Faith Assembly Church in Miramar Beach (affectionately known as "The Rock & Roll Church"), invited Jimy to launch a quarterly appreciation lunch there, thus reaching vets and first responders in the Walton/Okaloosa area. The appreciation lunch has taken place there ever since, slowly growing in attendance and giving away one HVAC unit per quarter, for a total of 12 HVAC units given away per year.

"I feel that giving back to veterans and first responders is like taking the time to help my father," says Jimy, whose father served in the U.S. Marines. "It's something that comes second nature; it's instinctive and something that's driven in me."

Inflation, interest rates and the current state of things

Inflation has had more impact over the past than at any time in almost the past 40 years. After peaking at 9.1 percent in July, inflation came in a little lower in August at 8.5 percent. Producer and import prices remained high and the supply change problems persisted. The chip shortage affected just about everything (would you believe more than 300 chips go into a car?).

Going back in history, inflation in 1981 was above 10 percent and by 1982 the unemployment rate was over 10 percent and interest rates were well above that. The USA and the world experienced two recessions in the early '80s and those followed a very difficult period of the 1970s where the markets underperformed and the economy struggled. The Dow Jones Industrials Average was higher in 1972 than it was in 1982. And then, things began to change. It started with changes in tax legislation, private and public investment and believe it or not, the decline of the US dollar. The economy grew, interest rates came down, unemployment came down, and inflation made its way down to less than 2 percent over the past two decades. Prosperity was more that norm than the exception. Fast forward to today and the Dow is over 33,000 at this writing, which is up from 742 in August of 1982.

Today, a lasting labor shortage

Investors are right to wonder just how we ended up here. There is no one answer – it is a combination of things. First is the tremendous monetary and fiscal stimulus throughout the

pandemic. That unleashed a lot of capital which many still have saved, invested or can borrow and at still historically low rates. Next, many left their jobs (38 million in 2021) and either went to other jobs or, at a significant pace, started their own businesses. Third, the combined impact of stock market and real estate markets over the past few years had many people feeling more confident of retiring early. What do these things add up to? Wage pressures, which keep inflation elevated. Investors should take note to consider those investments that have historically out-

paced inflation.

The real rate of return is what is left after inflation (and don't forget taxes). As inflation has risen many investments (cash, CDs, many bonds) have had a low to negative real return. That is not always easy to realize so investors and savers are encouraged to take a step back and consider the real return. Most people want to keep pace with inflation at the very least and to outpace it at the very best. Stocks and real estate still command the lead for returns vs inflation and other asset classes. Of course those asset classes come with higher degrees of risk and volatility.

Vanguard says bonds are back

In its recent paper "Active Fixed Income Perspectives Q3 2022: Bonds are back," Vanguard points out several key things for investors to consider. Most important of these is that bonds have had the worst performance in history over the first six months of 2022. They point out however that real returns, or positive returns, now exist. They argue "with bond yields higher than expected inflation over the next five years and beyond." We agree with their sentiment that bonds once again offer diversification and less risk for investors' portfolios after not having done so in the recent past. We also look at the returns on municipals (for those in higher tax brackets), and according to Raymond James, some of the best values may exist with maturities in the 8-20 maturity range. Raymond James also makes available to investors the important statistic of duration, which is a measure of risk for a given bond which considers its maturity and call dates.

Insights for Investors

Energy Commentary

Europe continues to adapt to the crisis and is bringing some coal-fired plants back and Norway recently vowed to outproduce Russia in natural gas supply as long as the crisis lasts. Natural gas prices at this writing are at their highest levels in the past 14 years. The implication for investors in our opinion is to continue to overweight holdings in the energy sector relative to its current weighting (in the S&P 500) which is 4.4 percent. That is significantly lower than it was just 10 years ago. Another way we see it is that despite the pandemic, and the crisis in Europe, the world continues to grow and more and more people in emerging and developing countries are increasing their standards of living. The demand for electricity might continue to grow significantly in the US. In a recent editorial, the Los Angeles Times pointed out that California alone could see energy consumption grow as much as 68 percent by 2045. They argue that in line with the electrification of cars, that would be a key driver. The world will need more energy from whatever form it may come. We also think investors should pay attention to the reemergence of nuclear power. States and countries are hard at work solving for waste storage and there is also the long-term promise of small modular reactors which create a fraction of the waste. While a lot of companies are working on that technology it is not near being scalable.

Interest rates and savings rates

Investors can finally enjoy more competitive returns on their most conservative investments. Many brokerage firms and financial institutions are now offering CDs over 3 percent for one year and many money market fund yields have increased as short-term rates have increased. Many are left wondering how long rates will continue to climb. We are not convinced that it will become a long-term trend. We agree with a lot of the sentiment we hear



and read that short term rates are likely to peak at 3.5 percent. We will have to see what the future brings.

Your Customized Auto Policy Just Got More Expensive

In July, we learned that Florida has the highest homeowner premiums in the country. And today it's official, we now have the highest auto rates too! The average annual premium in 2022 is \$2,560, compared to the national average of \$1,682.

In Florida and most states, auto insurance is required to register and legally operate a vehicle. Like most lines of insurance in Florida, rates have been on a rise for the past few years. It may be tempting to only purchase enough coverage to meet our state's minimum requirements. Don't do it! These low limits are not enough to protect you and your family if the worst circumstances happen.

Your car insurance policy is an important financial tool. If your car or you are involved in a wreck, theft or natural disaster (hurricane, flood or fire), the impact on your financial viability can be substantial. Your car insurance should be tailored to protect you, other people and assets from most of the associated expenses and costs in the event you are involved in an accident. Your lender, who legally owns the car, may have their own requirements and will want to be financially protected if there is a collision or other damage.

There are six basic types of coverages for your auto, motor home, motorcycle and LSV's that are registered with the state.

Liability – Coverage that offers protection against claims alleging that a driver's negligence resulted in bodily injury or property damage to another party. This can include the driver and passengers of the other vehicle or vehicles involved, injured pedestrians and owners of the property where the accident occurred.

The more assets you need to protect, the higher the limits should be. For those with significant assets, an Umbrella policy is recommended for increased protection. In most cases the Umbrella will require minimum underlying Liability limits of \$250,000/\$500,000.

Medical Expenses – Coverage for medical expenses be-



cause of bodily injury sustained by an insured caused by an accident. This covers your medical bills (not lost wages), regardless of who is at fault in a crash. Usual limits offered \$1,000, \$5,000 and \$10,000.

Uninsured/Underinsured Motorist Coverage – This coverage pays for your and your passengers' medical bills and property damage if the driver at fault in an accident doesn't have insurance, has insufficient coverage, or the incident is a hitand-run. It is recommended to carry limits equal to the liability limits on a Stacked (broader) Basis rather than Non-Stacked.

PIP/Personal Injury Protection - Mandated by Florida, provides medical, disability, and death benefits to you and any passengers in your vehicle. Basic PIP covers up to 80 percent of your medical ex-



penses and 60 percent of your lost wages.

Collision – Physical damage coverage for your vehicle if it is impacted by another vehicle or damaged in an accident. This coverage is usually required by a lienholder on a leased or financed vehicle.

Comprehensive – Covers damage to your vehicle caused by an event other than a collision, such as fire, theft, vandalism, hail and flood damage. Like collision, this coverage is usually required by a lienholder on a leased or financed vehicle.

Other Recommended Coverages – There are many other coverages that should be considered when reviewing your Personal Insurance Program. Included are Loss of Use or Rental Reimbursement, Roadside Assistance, Accident Forgiveness, Gap, New Car Replacement, Diminishing Deductible, Pay-Per Mile Coverage, Customized Equipment and Original Equipment Coverage.

With the popularity of Uber and Lyft, one can now obtain Rideshare Insurance. This is supplemental coverage for drivers of the ride-hauling services, which is typically inexpensive. It provides valuable coverage for situations that are not covered by a driver's personal car insurance policy. If you are a rideshare driver, please discuss options with your insurance agent. Many of our neighbors and customers have golf carts, or LSVs (low speed vehicles). As long as they're not rented, they can be written as a separate policy, or added to your auto policy if they are licensed for road use. The rental exposure can sometimes be written under a commercial liability policy, but the coverage is not as broad as an auto policy.

Many of our neighbors and customers have teenagers who are approaching the driving age and wonder how best to insure these exposures. If you have a new driver in the household, all insurance companies recognize the increase in risk with a new driver. Some insurance carriers will not insure new drivers while others will charge higher premiums to make up for the increased exposure. There are some measures you can take to lower your insurance rate, like taking a driving course. This will help your new driver become more familiar with the rules of the road and educate him on ways to avoid accidents. When you are a new driver, it is worth taking it slow, stick to the roads you are familiar with, and avoid getting into stressful traffic situations.

The bottom line is to talk to your agent and get customized auto coverages that fit your personal needs. Make sure you are aware of all discounts that are available. According to industry statistics, one of every three drivers are underinsured!



"What old man?" she answered. "There hasn't been anybody in this store but you."


So the young man trotted out of the building. He wandered into the vacant parking lot. There was no rust-red Ford. In fact, there weren't many cars in the parking lot at all.

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A Pastor's Ponderings: Do the Ends Always Justify the Means?

The "ends" in this cliché represent a good outcome, while the "means" refer to the method or actions used to achieve the desired result. When a person says, "the ends justify the means," this implies that a noble enough outcome justifies whatever measures taken to achieve the objective. The Bible teaches the exact opposite approach. For instance, the Apostle Paul vehemently de-




nied following this godless way of thinking. "And not rather, (as we be slanderously reported, and as some affirm that we say,) let us do evil, that good may come? whose damnation is just." (Romans 3:8).

Paul never encouraged anyone to do wrong so long as good followed. Godly decisions are determined by what we do and how we do it. Does God care only about what we accomplish for him, not how we achieve it, or do the means and the outcome concern him? God doesn't just want us to achieve a good outcome regardless of cost. He wants us to bring glory to him in how that good materializes. When we strategize independent of God, we rob him of his rightful place. Interestingly, God may lead us to do the very thing we were going to do on our own, but when we do it without God's leading, our self-reliance becomes sinful.

It is essential to recognize that achieving a good idea is not necessarily God's design. The path God desires for each person to take is the path where he is the pilot. God's work must be done God's way. Dr. Bob Jones, Sr., once famously said, "It is never right to do wrong in order to get a chance to do right." Oh, if this could be the world's mantra or, at a minimum, the church's protocol.

Two biblical points encapsulate these truths: (1) God rewards only those who endeavor to live, work and function biblically. "And if a man also strive for masteries, yet is he not crowned, except he strive lawfully" (2 Timothy 2:5).

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History reveals some horrid examples of things done in the name of God and religion. The means used to bring about religion's goal of converting others to their way of thinking at all costs has no basis in scripture and no place in societies. Some religions have lied, cheated and even killed to accomplish their goal of converting people. Just like God never sanctioned this behavior in the religious sphere, He never approves this methodology in our everyday lives. Small immoralities are wrong even when used to achieve larger moralities.

The problem with the "ends justify the means" philosophy is that it puts the standards of morality into the hands of human beings and makes right and wrong subjective based on outcomes. The Bible warns against this repeatedly: "Woe unto them that call evil good, and good evil; that put darkness for light, and light for darkness; that put bitter for sweet, and sweet for bitter!" (Isaiah 5:20).

The ends-justify-the-means philosophy offers an excuse to do something we know is wrong when we view good outcomes as the pinnacle of success. Yet, true success must never be measured by results alone. Let each person endeavor to do right and live right so we may ask God's blessing upon our every undertaking.



It is as much an American musical staple as jazz, and rock and roll. These guys take a piece of music and make it their own. If you've heard her sing, you know she has amazing pipes, and is just a powerhouse. You will feel as though you are seeing Judy Garland singing live with the orchestra. There's a multimedia component that showcases vintage footage of The Judy Garland Show with tons of outtakes with Dean Martin, Sammy Davis Jr. and Frank Sinatra that make an entertaining trip down memory lane. It will be a fun concert to experience because we are creating a clubby, dinner theater at-



mosphere with café tables. You can do that or opt for regular seating.

ZW: March 11 is the Classical Connections concert featuring violinist Geneva Lewis. Tell us about her.

DF: Classical Connections is the "meat and potatoes" classical portion of what Sinfonia does and Geneva Lewis is an extraordinary young talented violinist. She's the winner of the 2020 Concert Artist Guild annual competition and a recipient of a 2021 Avery Fisher career grant, which is a major award and a big deal in the classical music world. She's a remarkable artist and she's doing Mendelssohn's Concerto for Violin which is one of the staples of the violin repertoire. Her performance is one not to miss. She is going to working with the Sinfonia Youth Orchestra doing outreach in our local schools as well.

ZW: Capping the season (April 29) is Beethoven versus Coldplay. This sounds like another perfect example of how you are redefining the symphony experience. Tell us what people can expect.

DF: Beethoven is immortal.

When you pair or mash Beethoven up with something on the pop scene, like Coldplay it's unexpected. For this concert, they're not just playing a piece by Beethoven and a piece by Coldplay side by side. This is a melding, a mashup of the internal. interwoven musical notation with vocalists and it is remarkable. It's an incredible way to listen to and rethink how music is connected. Steve Hackman, the producer, is a brilliant musician, composer, and arranger. It's totally unique, but it's accessible. How many people from the age of 15 don't know Coldplay? So, again, we hope this innovative offering brings in some new fac-

ZW: At the heart of Sinfonia's mission is music education. Tell us why.

DF: Our mission states succinctly that we "entertain, educate, inspire the community" and we aim to do that with everything we do. Education is the centerpiece of Sinfonia. It was founded not only for its entertainment value, but for the fact that Northwest Florida needed an organization that could be the proponent for arts education in schools, specifically

music education. We all know arts education is on a continual decline in all public schools. We've been more fortunate here in Northwest Florida, compared to some areas but in many cases our Link Up program, which is a year-long curriculum, is sometimes the only arts education these students receive.

We have a String Quartet, a resident Brass Quintet, and a Woodwind Quintet in residence — all going out to schools and the community and providing outreach and community engagement.

This year, we are reintroducing the Paint the Music project, which is a great cross-genre program that includes both visual arts and the musical arts. Kids receive a recording of what they will ultimately hear live at a Sinfonia concert, and they visually interpret what they hear on to paper. We take their artwork and display it at a concert. (Look for the Paint the Music exhibit at Get Happy in January.) The following Monday, the kids will sit in the convention center to see Beethoven Lives Upstairs, a theatrical mini musical featuring actors and singers sharing the lifetime of Beethoven with more than 30 excerpts of his music.

ZW: Congratulations, this is indeed a stellar 17th season.

In high school, my drama teacher showed me how to draw a ground plan to design a set. He taught me that every set designer starts their ground plan by drawing a centerline. This is a vertical dotted line down the center of the page, ending with the letters CL, usually drawn with the top of the L inside the C and the horizontal part below. In my youth and exuberance of learning all about theater, that image always stuck with me... the centerline.

Fast forward a few decades (or more) to a spring day last year... I was taking a walk out in the open air, enjoying nature and making a valiant effort to relax. I enjoy listening to music when I walk sometimes worship music, sometimes indie folk or sometimes laid back jazz like Jamie Cullum. On this particular day, I was allowing Spotify to present some new songs alongside my usual favorites. Rebeca Lake, ECTC's Set and Lighting Designer, had recently introduced the wonders of Spotify to me (showing my age here) as a great way to learn about other artists and songs that are similar to what I'm already listening to.

This particular day I was deep in thought, meditating and contemplating through a particular work puzzle that needed solving. As I'm walking along this beautiful trail, deep in reverie and listening to this new music, a song came on that provided an astounding moment of clarity. I had an astounding moment of clarity.

Here are the captivating words to this song that brought such an incredible feeling in that moment:

My mind's eye went to seeing all the children and teens who come to ECTC on a weekly basis. I want to see the love all around them. I thought of the volunteers and other patrons that come and find community at ECTC...I want to see the love all around them, too. My beautiful staff who pour their heart and soul into ECTC everyday...I want to see the love all around them too! I had to find out who wrote these soul piercing words. Fast forward several years, and as we are planning our 10th-season, Godspell comes up in discussion. Godspell is based on the teachings of Jesus which, as presented in Godspell, challenge us to love and build community. The entire premise of the show is based on this foundational commandement, "Thou shalt love the Lord, your God, with all your heart and all your soul. This is the greatest commandment. And the second is like it: Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. All the rest of the law, and all the prophets have written, is based on these first two."

The connection between Godspell and the building of ECTC over the last nine years is undeniably the building of community and the loving of others, the centerline of love. As we build the set, enact the Godspell story, and sing the songs, our whole focus has been just that a centerline of love. Our mission through Godspell and ECTC is to create a community of love. When Rebeca drew that CL for the Godspell ground plan and when she does it for every other set that our professional actors and our students perform on, every show that our patrons and families come see, all of it starts with the centerline of love.
